Monoprints inspired by the artist's love of jazz and the jazz greats. Created at the Bob Blackburn Printmaking Workshop, this print exhibit traveled nationally for two years to museums, art centers and university galleries and had a catalogue with an essay by Sharon Sutton, 1990.

Parades: Joseph Delaney.

Paintings and drawings by an African American artist who documented New York City's celebrations for over 50 years. This American scene painter was "on site" from D-day through the Iranian hostage parade, exhibition catalogue. 1982.

In-Sites I-VI.

Yearly exhibits of local artists to design improvements for the Lower East Side on the themes of the streetscape, pedestrian, bicycle and subway transportation, school facades, playgrounds and the natural environment. One exhibit honored the (then) 82 Lower East Side gardens many of whose founders and members were artists. As an extension into the community, five artists were "commissioned" to introduce nature into the local built environment that included murals, shop windows displays, mini-gardens ,and mosaics. Another artist created a Ground Zero environmental memorial in cl which was permanently installed at a local school.

Stencils of the Lower East Side.

A portable, simple and socially concerned art form created to communicate and protest concerns as part of rent strikes, injustice and other political struggles of the Lower East Side along with documentation

Exchanges I, II and III.

36 artists selected in a chain of emerging, mid-career and established artists in a three year exhibition series in which artists select artists whose work is especially meaningful to them.

Vital Signs.

24 artists respond to varied environmental and ecological issues through painting, drawing, sculpture ,installations and performance pieces. Accompanied by a performance program.

Two For One.

Pairing of 18 artists who collaborated in a process of shared work in painting, sculpture and installation.

Regalia.

Interpretations of body coverings by sculptors, painters, performance, theatre and fashion designers.

Jewish Folk Artists of the Lower East Side.

Painting, sculpture, fiber art, and traditional calligraphy by 12 artists with a photo essay of the artists at work. Part of a multi-year series celebrating traditional Lower East Side communities accompanied by an extensive program of walking tours, workshops, concerts, lectures and other events.

Voices of Henry Street:Portrait of a Community.

A photography exhibit by Harvey Wang with oral histories based on interviews of Settlements participants, staff and board celebrating the Settlement's centennial in 1993 with a catalog.
